Colonel Robert Testa enrolled in the CF in Montreal, QC well over 35 years ago, and promptly attended CMR and RMC, graduating with a Bachelor of Chemical Engineering (Nuclear).

He considers himself to be lucky to have served in all aspects of the Military Engineer Branch (unfortunately less Fire Fighting – but he did experience the charms of the "flash over simulator" - twice), and he enjoyed a very varied and multi-facetted career throughout his time in uniform.
